Daniel Fellows, Director of Media, Joey Herndon, Staff Writer - At Lecanto High School [LHS] students use all forms of technology, from Canvas to computers, in the course of their school day. To keep everything running smoothly in the school district, the Technology Resource Center [TRC] offers technical support, repairs, and updated textbooks to teachers and students.

"The TRC is the central hub for computer/iPad repair, support technology, and educating teachers on how to use Canvas, Skyward, and other software used by the schools," said administrative secretary Lisa Stewart.

While the TRC focuses mainly on technology, it also serves as a meeting place for teachers discussing what new textbooks to use in their classrooms.

"At the moment the TRC is working on textbook adoptions, where teachers meet and discuss what new textbooks they should use in their classrooms. In addition to purchasing new textbooks, we are also working with textbook companies on moving to digital versions of their books, so students can access everything they need from their iPads," said Stewart.

The TRC also employs Instructional Tech Coaches, who aid teachers physically or virtually via Zoom. Tech coaches educate teachers how to better utilize Canvas and other products in the classroom setting, as well as troubleshooting various issues that may arise.

"The role of the tech coaches here at the TRC is to better educate teachers on the systems that we use, like Skyward, Microsoft Office, and Canvas, so they can not only take better advantage of them and better improve their classes, but can also troubleshoot and fix issues that may arise in the classroom," said Eileen Jenkin, Instructional Technology Coach.

In addition to running important services for the school district, like Canvas and Skyward, TRC technicians also repair computers and iPads if they malfunction or are damaged.

"While the TRC manages a lot of software and services across the district, we also repair devices, such as student iPads, that might break or get damaged. We have a group of technicians that stays at the facility, and another group that travels to the district schools and conducts repairs on-site," said Lance Fletcher, TRC director.
